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From Hops to Housing for Historic Newmarket Buildings

A £10 million regeneration scheme in Newmarket, East Anglia, which will see the conversion of 19th Century malting kiln buildings into the centrepiece of a new housing development, has been awarded full planning permission by Forest Heath District Council.

The Atkins-designed scheme, on behalf of developer Build Force Ltd, consists of 59 units and knits together the collection of historic buildings, once used in the production of beer, with new contemporary mixed housing.

Produced by Atkins architects Conrad Moran and Lee Ferris, the project has had to overcome conflicting stakeholder interests, complex building constraints, rights of light and many conservation issues.

Associate Director Conrad Moran said: "Our challenge was to push the traditional premise of conservation and breath a new lease of life into these fantastic historic buildings; which have been unloved and forgotten for so long."

To overcome the problem of converting the maltings buildings into residential accommodation, the architects introduced a radical solution to improve internal circulation, achieved through the introduction of a four-storey atrium space.

The new build consists of a mixture of town houses and apartments which are designed to achieve the sustainable homes code 4. The design also allows exterior living sunspaces for every unit while creating child friendly streets and courtyards.

The construction phase is due to start in July 2008, with an estimated completion date of summer 2010.
